### **Action on Minutes of Previous Meetings as Follows**

Minutes of the Town Board Meeting of September 6, 2022 and Agenda Meeting of September 27, 2022 were presented to the Board. A motion was made by Councilman Boudreau, seconded by Councilwoman Marble to accept the minutes as presented. All voted in favor of the motion.

Supervisor Lawler stated that we have a few awards to present tonight and he would like to honor these individuals first. He turned the presentation over to Councilman David Ball.

Councilman Ball stated that we have a REMO presentation, Regional Emergency Medical Operation, this evening for first responders who are being recognized for their efforts in a successful cardiac arrest reversal for a local gentleman.

Waterford Rescue Squad Director Tracy Weir spoke about the incident and stated that REMO puts forth the protocols that are followed by emergency services.

Supervisor Lawler went on to thank all the first responders for the work that you do to keep our community safe. We are very grateful, you are all talented dedicated individuals. These are amazingly highly trained people, our community is very lucky. We have an opportunity to recognize these individuals: Two individuals could not be here tonight Officer Matt Gibbins and Firefighter Jeff Berry. Here tonight from the Waterford Rescue Squad; Eric Henchet and Jim Connolly; from the Waterford Fire Department Jim Kelly, Nick Cook, Gary O'Connor and Chief Don Baldwin.

Supervisor Lawler addressed the individuals and stated that you saved someone's life, thank you for all that they you do.

The Supervisor paused the meeting for a short break at 7:14PM.

The meeting resumed at 7:16PM

## **Committee Reports**

### **Financial Report and Submission of Bills and Petty Cash**

Supervisor Lawler read the financial reports for the month of September 2022. The audited vouchers totaled \$ 661,647.82 and the payments in advance of audit totaled \$45,370.69. The petty cash report totaled \$37.03. A motion to accept the financial reports, pay the abstracts and reimburse petty cash was made by Councilman Boudreau and seconded by Councilman McClement. All voted in favor of the motion.

### **Committee on Highway, Wastewater Treatment, Water Authority, Cemetery and Museum**

Councilman Boudreau read the September report for the Highway Department.

The Sewer Jet truck was used to jet the sewer main for 55 Middletown Rd and 301 Hudson River Rd, both issues were resolved. Stormwater culvert pipes were replaced at 24 Timber Dr. and 16 Barley Ct. Stormwater training and certification was completed. 9 Tons of blacktop was used for road repair. 210 yards of yard waste was collected. 120 yards of trash was collected. 30 yards of scrap metal was collected. The Highway Department responded to 32 requests for service and processed 39 Dig Safe requests with 8 emergencies. The Highway Department would like to remind everyone that October is the last month for trash drop off, dates are as follows: October 15, 22, and 29th. October 22nd is also Hazardous Household Day. Town and Village residents are required to pre-register in order to participate. Registration forms can be picked up at Town Hall, the Town Highway Garage or printed from the Town of Waterford website, [www.town.waterford.ny.us](http://www.town.waterford.ny.us) and must be returned to Town Hall or the Highway Garage no later than October 19, 2022. There is no fee to participate. If you have any questions please call the Highway garage at (518)-235-3413.

The Councilman then went on to read the monthly report for September for the Wastewater Treatment Plant. Average Influent Flow: 996,000 gallons/day

They removed: 14,000 gallons of sludge to Albany County, 42,000 gallons of sludge to Saratoga County

High Flow-2,

Power-2,

Mechanical-2

Normal Maintenance: Checked all pump stations and cleaned floats as needed.

Continued maintenance of outside grounds, equipment, and vehicles. Removed influent primary grease from primary tanks and weirs on weekly basis.

We finalized the yearly EPA DMR.:QA reporting and all of the testing passed and was accepted.

The A-Team pulled, inspected, removed debris from, reinstalled pump #1 and changed out the start capacitor at the Birch Glen pump station.

We used the vac truck to clean out Birch Glen, Drake Court, Suncrest Drive, Sage Road, Timber Drive, Fonda Road, Mallard's North and South, Canvasback, Towpath and Front Street pump stations.

Troy Belting re-wired and changed the control parameters on control Drive #1.

We used the sewer camera at #53 Middletown Road in conjunction with the Highway Department jetting the main sewer line. There was no blockage found in the lateral. BPI Piping added metal patches to the tank on the Tanker and hard suction piping on the vac truck.

Riberdy Diesel conducted the yearly inspection and service on the Tanker truck. There is still no delivery date on the new tanker cab and chassis.

The Wastewater Department would again like to remind residents to please refrain from dumping/flushing wipes and other non-biodegradable materials down your toilet or through your garbage disposals. All of these types of materials should be going in with your household trash. They can not only cause backups in home piping and laterals but can cause blockages and clogging in pumps in pump stations which can cause system backups.

Councilman Boudreau then read the September report for the Waterford Water Commissioners. Water Consumption - The Water Works delivered approximately 37,260,000 gallons or 1,201,935 gpd of water during the month.

Water Distribution System Work - The staff completed 29 dig-safe utility locations as well as 117 service calls during the month. In addition to calls, staff calibrated & maintained equipment, completed monthly water testing, and completed meter reading.

Meter Installation - Staff continues to reach out to residents and schedule replacement of old meters for replacement with drive by read meters. Staff have logged 2215 meters installed to date. We are continuing to drop off door knocker notifications, to customers who need to be changed out. Our installation efforts are being stalled by customer non-response. We are introducing a meter reading fee of \$50 per quarter for any locations that have not scheduled to have their old meter replaced with the new drive by meter system. Customers will be required to schedule their installation for next year by Dec 31, 2022. The meter reading and processing fee will be applied each quarter in the New Year to customers who have not scheduled. Letters are being sent directly to the customers affected.

Hydrant Maintenance- As Autumn closes in we have begun the process of winterizing our hydrants, and ensuring they have location flags/markers attached. If you see a hydrant that does not have a snow marker, please reach out to the Water Commissioners and we will put it on the top of the list. The Councilman then read the update from Town Historian Russ Vandervoort. He was in Kingston, NY for 3 days at the Public Historians Conference. There were over 100 in attendance. Representing Saratoga County were the County Historian, the Towns of Clifton Park, Malta, Waterford, and the City of Saratoga Springs. At the conference, Public Historians met the requirements to be designated Registered Public Historians, and I was one of those four. I attended a Civil War Talk at the Saratoga County History Center concerning the 77th Regiment out of Saratoga. I have done considerable research on Waterford's involvement in that Regiment. Waterford only had about 7 in the Regiment; one was Jesse White, and he was a Captain. I asked the speaker if he was familiar with him. He was and provided me with his picture. I conducted a historical canal walk for about 30 people. We walked from the Side Cut Locks at Lock 2 Park along the old Champlain to Lock 4 behind the Waterford Museum. Many thanks to Chris Callaghan for his assistance that day.

I served as 1st ever Grand Marshal of the Annual Tugboat Parade and participated in the Canallers Roundtable Event on the 2nd day.

The Saratoga County History Center at Brookside Museum plans a 2023 display of Saratoga County Manufacturers. I am making the arrangements between them and the Waterford Museum for their, made in Waterford, Mohawk-Hudson Manufacturing Company (Eddy Valve) Stove to be a part of that display.

Councilman Boudreau then gave an update from the Waterford Museum.

On Friday October 14<sup>th</sup> from 7pm-8pm at the Museum. "Did you read it in the paper" Explore curated clippings from the Waterford Area Good News Newspapers (1992-1995). Admission \$10.00 per person. The Winter Lecture Series at the Van Schaick Country Club kickoff Lecture Tuesday November 8<sup>th</sup>- 7PM speaker Russ Vandervoort. "Oh Those Nolan Girls, Pretty & Poisonous". Admission \$10.00 per person per lecture. Lectures will be held on December 13<sup>th</sup>, January 10<sup>th</sup> and March 14<sup>th</sup>. Dinner is available for a separate purchase.

### **Committee on Public Safety, Emergency Services, and Liaison to Village**

Councilman Ball read the summary of activity for the department. There were 39 arrests, 150 traffic tickets issued, 8 motor vehicle accidents and 612 calls for service.

Other activity:

Inspectors from NYS DCJS came to the station for an audit of Department Policies as they pertain to NYS Accreditation. No issues were discovered and all policies examined were found to be in compliance.

Sergeant Dilbone held a, "Coffee with a Cop" event at the Waterford Senior Center.

Officer Wagner represented Waterford PD at a 9/11 Remembrance Ceremony at the Cohoes-Waterford Elks Club.

Officer Fifield attended training on dealing with Emotionally Disturbed Persons put on by the Saratoga County Sheriff's Office.

Councilman Ball stated that last year the department implemented a plan to upgrade police equipment. The new body cams have arrived and training began today. They plan to implement these on all shifts within the next 10 days. They are actively discussing an active shooter drill with the Waterford Halfmoon School. A brand new server was installed in the department to help with all online services. The Police Activity Report also shows the summary of arrests and call per type. The last page of the report details open/active cases and their status.

### **Committee on Veterans, Grants and Funding, Special Projects, Town Hall and**

Councilman McClement read the Waterford Seniors report for September.

Attendance for September 2022- 317 Visitors; New Members- 4

October will bring on lots of activity here at the Center. Aside from all our regular daily activities, there will be Chili Cook Off Contest on Thurs Oct 20<sup>th</sup>. The Fall Day Fun Day is a new activity being introduced. This will be held on Wednesday afternoons in October and November. It will be a great place to drop in and play some games and socialize.

On Tuesday September 20<sup>th</sup> 2022 Sergeant Michael Dilbone from the Waterford Police Dept came to the Center to discuss Safety for Seniors in the Community. There was time for

questions as many different topics came up some of which were where to call in case of an emergency, personal safety and the role the dept plays in keeping our community secure. There was an amazing turnout. We thank our Police officers for keeping us safe.

The Van Gogh Exhibit held at the Schenectady Amory was a hit. The Seniors were enthralled by this display of the master Van Gogh's works. Afterward the group came back to the Center and were treated to a pizza party hosted by the Town of Waterford.

The Seniors will be taking a day trip up to the Saratoga Racino on Fri Oct 21<sup>st</sup>.

Coming up in November is yet another great day trip offered to our Seniors! On Wednesday November 9<sup>th</sup>, we are going to the Yankee Candle Flagship Store located in South Deerfield, Mass. Enjoy a day filled with shopping and plan to grab some lunch on the premises. We are taking a Yankee Trails Coach Bus and anticipate a sold-out trip. Coordinating with the Saratoga Co Public Health and Marra's Pharmacy, The Waterford Community/Senior Center will be hosting a Flu Vaccination/Covid Booster Clinic on Tues Oct 25<sup>th</sup> from 10 am- 12 pm. More information on this event will be announced early October.

There will be an upcoming presentation conducted by Albany Med working in conjunction with Saratoga County Public Health. The presentation will be on "Fall Prevention" which will be scheduled sometime this November.

The Councilman then went on to talk about current grants and funding. The roof upgrade project for the DPW garage is ongoing. There is a resolution this evening to approve a Change Order with Titan Roofing to install new gutters and downspouts. The cost is \$15, 500. Even with this increase, the overall cost is still significantly lower than the next highest bidder for the project.

Councilman McClement added that the VFW Post and American Legion are actively looking for new members. The American Legion can be reached on Facebook. We plan to host the color guard at the November meeting to celebrate Veterans Day.

### **Committee on Youth, Playground, Pool, Festivals, Library, WHUFSD, Visitor Center and Building Department**

Councilwoman Marble read an update from the Waterford Library.

They will be holding our Halloween Party here at the library on Thursday Oct. 27 from 5-7pm. All are welcome and various activities are planned along with refreshments.

Costumes are encouraged of course!

The Friends of the Library will be holding an informational meeting at the library on Monday October 17 at 6pm, anyone interested in helping or being a Friend of the Library is welcome.

The library wishes to thank the Waterford Bocce League for welcoming our library team to their new co-ed league. We were all novices at the game of Bocce and the seasoned members of the organization were very patient and helpful to us. Our team was made up of both staff and patrons alike.

We also wish to thank the Waterford Harbor Farmer's Market for helping make our first season of participation a big success. Special thanks to Tara King for her efforts to spread the word about the library's programs and services, and to all who filled out one of our surveys. We look forward to taking part again in 2021!

The Councilwoman then read the monthly report from the Building Department.

There were 27 building permits issued, 31 Onsite construction inspections completed. 1 stop work order, 35 stops for curbside trash, 9 stops for overgrowth. All but 2 have complied, 1 order to vacate, 1 abandoned and neglected pool has been drained and a proper cover has been installed.

Discussions and meetings have been done with the owners of 60 Clifton St and 90 Hudson River Road regarding the vacant standings of the properties. Steps are being put into place to speed up the projects and hold the owners accountable for their properties.

Councilwoman Marble then read the monthly report from the Canal Visitor Center.

The legendary Tugboat Round-up took place on September 9<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup>. The Tugboat Parade, Fireworks and Tug Chug, SK road race as well as the line toss competition and the ever-popular nose to nose competition were all well received by the very large crowds that enjoyed the festivities.

We were also honored to have the United States Coast Guard Cutter, Hawser in port for the weekend. Many thanks to all the volunteers that helped make the weekend a huge success. Our volunteer corp. continues their mission of serving our community and welcoming visitors, thus far our volunteers recoded 2177 hours, including 527 hours for the month of September. Thank you!

For the month of September, we welcomed 137 boaters from 31 states, 4 Canadian provinces as well as 2 boats from Germany. Year to date we have welcomed 772 boats compared to 714 boats thorough September 2021.

The Erie and Champlain Canals are scheduled to close on October 12<sup>th</sup> and the Federal Lock at Troy will close on November 11<sup>th</sup>.
